PLEASE GET INVOLVED IN THE CAMPAIGN FOR FAIRER FUNDING

The government is consulting on proposals for changes to school funding that will result in a £9.3 million reduction to education funding in Cheshire East, with 131 out of 146 schools seeing a reduction in funding. At present Cheshire East is one of the worst funded local authorities in the country (145th out of 150) at £4,209 per child. The new proposals make Cheshire East the worst funded local authority at only £4,122 per child, which is £87 less per child than now.

If we received the national average per secondary school child of £4,732 per child, this would amount to an extra £628,000 per year for us.

Tytherington School will lose £61,000 per year plus the loss of the Education Support Grant of £79,000 which is a loss of £140,000 per year, which is 2.7% of our budget.

All schools in Cheshire East and Cheshire East Council are working together to challenge these grossly unfair proposals. We believe our children are being discriminated against as a result of the postcode of their school.

We ask for your support in the matter and we strongly urge you to:

Contact our local MP, David Rutley (<u>david.rutley.mp@parliament.uk</u>), who is campaigning on our behalf, to express your concerns about the consequences of this funding formula for us.

We are committed to ensure children in Cheshire East have the same opportunities as children in other local authorities. I really appreciate your support and understanding on this matter and please do contact me if you have any questions.

In light of these cuts to school budgets, I will be writing to parents in the next few weeks about our fundraising plans to ensure that we continue to provide youngsters with an excellent standard of education.

MR O'BRIEN IN PROFILE

Where do you live?

I currently live in Stockport in a small village called Marple.

How long have you worked at Tytherington? I'm currently in my sixth year at Tytherington, although it seems like only yesterday when I started!

What did you do before you came to Tytherington? I worked as a Learning Supervisor at a school in Stockport. It was a great school and helped me take the next steps into training to become a teacher.

Did you always want to become a teacher?

For a time, I wanted to be a professional ice hockey player for the Toronto Maple Leafs but decided that teaching was much better! I really made my mind up to become a teacher when volunteering at a charity school in India after finishing my degree.



What is your typical day like?

I don't think a 'typical day' exists for me! It starts early and finishes late but no day is ever the same. As a teacher, I have my set lessons where I can go from teaching Year 7 about life in the Middle Ages to teaching the significance of the 1911 Parliament Act with Year 12. As a Head of Year, I get to work closely with Year 9 students in a number of different areas. It could mean helping them make their choices for KS4 or offering pastoral support to students and their families. It means that you never quite know where the day is going to take you.

What is your favourite part of the job?

As a teacher, I love the feeling you get when you know that students have really been thinking about your lesson because their still talking about it as they leave the room. As a Head of Year, it's great to see students you have supported reach a point where they no longer need you there at their side because they have learnt the skills to manage. It's currently great to see how mature the Year 11s have become as they were my first group of Year 9s.

What were your favourite subjects at school?

History of course! There is no surprise that I loved my History lessons and enjoyed the stories as well as the analytical challenges it offered. I was also a big fan of Geography, English and Physics and loved study Psychology at A-Level.

What do you do outside of school, what are your hobbies?

I love travelling to new places and meeting new people so will take any opportunity to disappear to a foreign land. When I get time, I love to read and to spend time outdoors. I also like the odd game of squash or badminton but alas, my dreams of an ice hockey career are currently on hold!

What are your ambitions for the future?

My current ambitions lie very closely with Tytherington and I'm really enjoying seeing our school go from strength to strength. It's been great to be a part of the changes and can't wait to see what the next chapter has to offer. I am also hoping to complete a Masters Degree in Education in the not too distant future as you are never too old to learn something new!

What advice would you give Tytherington students for the future?

To never be afraid of what may never come but instead focus on the opportunities that are yet to appear. It is often too easy to give up or never try when we are worried about something. Although harder, taking on challenges and adversity can often be much more rewarding. Never be afraid of the unknown, embrace it!

Family Life

I live in Tytherington with my husband John - we have lived here for over 20 years now. We have seen both our daughters lay great foundations for their lives with the help of Tytherington School.

What do you do?

On a more restful note I enjoy reading. Being a member of 2.5(!) book groups I always have lots of great suggestions for my next read.


What piece of advice would you give Tytherington students for the future?


<u>Upcoming fixtures</u>
