TYTHERINGTON SCHOOL SECURES £1 MILLION FUNDING FOR MAJOR BUILDING PROJECT



Tytherington School have been successful in securing nearly £1 million from the government's Condition Improvement Fund (CIF). The CIF provides access to capital funding for academies through an annual bidding process. There are two priority areas: building condition and expansion. The money will be used to improve the conditions of roofing at the school.

Headteacher, Manny Botwe, said: "We are delighted to be one of the few schools selected to receive such a huge capital investment. The roofing work will improve the learning environment for our students and significantly change the look of the school."

Local MP David Rutley said: "It is great that Tytherington School has received this significant capital investment from the Department for Education, which will help to improve facilities and create an even better learning environment for the pupils. I congratulate all at Tytherington School on this achievement, and I look forward to visiting in the future, to see the completed works."

MILLIE'S TRUST TRAINING

A-Level Textile students visit Textile Artist studio



GETTING THE MOST OUT OF PARENTS' EVENING

THE PURPOSE OF PARENTS' EVENINGS

For any child to be successful the triangular relationship between each student, their home and the school needs to be strong. Parents' evenings are a key element in providing the opportunity for face-to-face communication and to support the progress of the student.



PARENTS' EVENINGS AT TYTHERINGTON SCHOOL

At Tytherington School, we have at least one parents' evening per year group, with Years 11, 12 & 13 having two. They are set at times following key monitoring windows in the school calendar and run from 4pm to 7pm.

PARENTS' EVENING APPOINTMENTS

Appointments are 5 minutes long (10 minutes for Years 12 & 13), allowing time for feedback on progress and engagement, and imparting a key strategy for further improvement within each subject.

The following table provides guidance on what students, parents and school staff should be aiming to gain from each appointment:

- Absorb all information/advice that is imparted and use it to support their child in making improvements and further progress in learning.

Students should...

- Gain an understanding of how well they are progressing in their learning, including a quick summary of:
 - o Areas of strength
 - Areas for improvement
- Gain an understanding of their teacher's view about their engagement in learning, including a quick summary of:
 - Where their engagement is supporting their progress.
 - Where/how they can improve their engagement to support their progress.
- Gain an understanding of where/how best to invest time and energy in their learning, in school and at home.
- Absorb all information/advice that is imparted and use it to make improvements and further progress in learning.

School Staff should...

- Impart an understanding of how well the student is progressing in their learning, including a quick summary of:
 - Areas of strength
 - Areas for improvement
- Impart an understanding of their view about the student's engagement in learning, including a quick summary of:
 - Where their engagement is supporting their progress.
 - Where/how they can improve their engagement to support their progress.
- Impart an understanding of where/how the student would be best to invest time and energy in their learning, in school and at home.
- Impart an understanding of where/how best parents can invest time and energy in supporting their child's learning.

Openness at the appointment is key to facilitating improvement in progress. Communicating and knowing where strengths and areas for improvement lie, in learning and engagement, support progress and improve children's outcomes and achievement.

ROSE DAY BY YEAR 7 ADVANCED LEARNERS

For the first ROSE Day of the year, the Year 7 Advanced Learners took part in a 'Newsletter Challenge'. Their task was to report on all the events of the day and meet the deadline of 15.20 to have their Newsletters ready to print. Here is one of their articles on the main events of the day.

We interviewed Mr Botwe about ROSE Day. At the interview he said that ROSE Day is an abbreviation of 'respect of others, self and environment.' It is a day for students to be off timetable and learn many valuable life lessons. This event has been a Tytherington School tradition for around six years now. All skills learnt will help pupils later on during life.

<u>Year 7:</u> We interviewed Harry Muir and Taylor Hadfield who said, "We are making chocolate bars in form and branding them. "Taylor told us she was excited because, "We get to eat chocolate and working in groups for projects is extremely good for developing our teamwork skills." Harry told us he hopes that it will help him in business and future jobs.

<u>Year 8:</u> Year 8s were looking at multi-culturalism. During their activities they did traditional dance and egg dropping. When making their parachutes to prevent their egg from cracking, they used a variety of materials to cushion the egg.

<u>Year 9:</u> Year 9 were doing a range of activities as part of a Community Challenge. This is where you do five hours of help for the school by painting benches, litter picking and preparing a presentation for Mr Botwe. Throughout the day they learnt new skills whilst working in teams.

<u>Year 10:</u> Into Year 10 now and learning about the effects of smoking, drugs and alcohol. They learn about the effects of drugs and what chemicals are in them. These include rat poison, rocket fuel and acids in cigarettes.

<u>Year 11:</u> Year 11 were learning about how to apply for future careers. During this they did many teambuilding exercises to improve their social skills. One of the activities was balloon construction. We interviewed Megan Evans. Here's what we found out in our hands on interview, "Rose Day gives you opportunities to learn about things you don't learn about in the curriculum. It is a good opportunity to learn about the outside world."

<u>Year 12:</u> Year 12 were learning study skills and how to revise for tests. They learnt many strategies such as colour coding notes and being organised. This is a challenging time for them but we are confident they have it in them.

<u>Year 13:</u> At the moment, Year 13 are filling in their applications for university. They have to be honest and put their best qualities forward. They have all worked so hard on it.

Student Parliament: The student parliament are a group of people trying to make the school a better and more interesting place. This afternoon, the student parliament taste-tested the food in the canteen.

<u>Advanced Learners</u>: The advanced learners group was created two years ago. It is designed to stretch and challenge students doing very well in school.

Well done to all of the Year 7 Advanced Learners group whose paper, 'The Tythy Times' hit the deadline and was full of interesting facts and interviews about the day.

TRANSITION UPDATE



It has been a very busy couple of weeks for our transition team and student ambassadors!

Over the last 6 weeks, we have welcomed hundreds of Year 5 and 6s to a variety of events that have been held. Our annual Open Day and Evening, which also coincided with the European Day of Languages, was held on Tuesday 26th September. As part of the day, 120 pupils from Parkroyal Community School took part in a morning of language lessons and cultural activities. Part of the morning was spent learning four new languages, Spanish, Japanese, Arabic and Russian. The pupils then spent time making Faberge eggs and Piñatas, and practicing their new skills in Arabic and Japanese. Also on Open Day we invited Year 5 Pupils from Dean Valley to take part in an Indian Dance Workshop, which was great fun.

We have also supported Hollinhey Primary School with their languages day delivering Spanish, Arabic and German lessons to pupils from Year 1-6. It was a great event organised by Ms Jacot from Hollinhey and we were assisted by our fab Year 12 French students.

The transition team have also welcomed pupils from Year 5 to creative writing, history and music workshops. Pupils have had the opportunity to learn about life as a child during WW2, how to write creative stories and learning to play percussion instruments with our new music teacher Mr Beecher.

A WORD ON THE SUCCESS OF OUR GCSES

As you may be aware, the Department for Education released provisional GCSE data earlier this week on their web-

site. We are delighted to see that our students have done extremely well in several areas in comparison to the national and local picture. It gives us great pleasure to be able to report that we were placed in the top three schools in Cheshire East in the important measure of students gaining a standard pass (4+) in both English and Maths. We were also placed sixth in the 'basics' measure of the proportion of students gaining Grade 5 or above in both English and Maths. We are also happy to report that we are in the top 5 schools in the county for attainment in the Ebacc measure. These are pleasing results which will yet again mean that we feature in the top quartile for attainment in the country.

Tythering to Tyschool Tyschool

Progress 8 scores are very much a reflection of the curriculum which students study in any given school. As a values driven

school, we take a very clear stance on what we teach students. Our curriculum will always be built around the needs of our students rather than school league tables. Without a doubt, we could very quickly improve our Progress 8 score by, for example, forcing all students to take the full suite of Ebacc subjects or by entering youngsters for qualifications that are easy to pass but have limited value as far as sixth forms, colleges and employers are concerned. We believe this would be wrong and I am happy to accept that, on this measure at least, the official performance tables will not truly and accurately reflect how well we are doing.

I would like to take this opportunity to once again congratulate the youngsters who did extremely well in the GCSE examinations.
