## YEAR 10 SPEAKERS SHINE IN ROTARY COMPETITION

Three promising young orators from Tytherington have recently taken part in the *Rotary Youth Speak Competition*, a contest run by Rotary Clubs in districts around the country to give young people the opportunity to voice their views on topics they are passionate about and acquire valuable experience of speaking in public. The students were hastily drafted in to compete in the Biddulph heat on January 18<sup>th</sup> at late notice after the Senior team from another local school pulled out of the competition. Our team, comprising of Tallulah Howarth, Layla Sipi and Harriet Terrington in Year 10 only had two weeks to prepare for the competition, whereas the other competing schools had been getting ready since last May!

The girls decided to prepare a presentation on the subject of *Gender Roles*, a topic close to their hearts – particularly for Tallulah, who runs a Feminist Group for students from her own year group, as well as Year 11 and the Sixth Form. Tallulah took on the role as main speaker, whilst Layla became the Chairperson who has to organise the team on the night, and Harriet took the position of the Proposer of the Vote of Thanks, who has to offer comments on the speech and conduct the formal end of the proceedings. Unfortunately, Harriet was ill on the day, which was disappointing for her and for the team, especially as she had put a lot of work into her speech and written some well researched and original ideas. Thankfully, Rhian Brown in Year 13, who has some experience of Public Speaking through the ESU Debating Contest and who is also a member of the feminist group, valiantly stepped into the breach at the very last minute, and did a brilliant job.

The regional heat took place at the Victoria Centre in Biddulph on January 18<sup>th</sup>. There were 5 competing schools, and the standard of presentation was very high, as was commented upon by the judges. Although our team did not win, they gave an excellent and thought-provoking insight into the issues surrounding gender roles, both historically and in a contemporary context. The judges commented on the “passionate” nature of their presentation, and the clarity and engaging nature of their performance.

Mary Grant who organised the event for the Rotary Club said: “ Your team were a credit to your school and to Mrs Burke. Layla Sipi (Chairperson), Tallulah Howarth (Speaker) and Rhian Brown (stand-in Vote of Thanks) gave a splendid performance with their topic 'Gender roles'. Indeed, given that they had only a few weeks of preparation, their performance was remarkable. The Rotary Club of Macclesfield Castle are delighted to have sponsored a team from Tytherington School and hope to do so again on a future occasion.”

## ADVANCED LEARNERS UPDATE

It has been another busy year so far for the Advanced Learner Programme. Last term, students engaged in a wide range of activities, some of which are outlined below.

The year kicked off with the *Rose Day Newspaper Challenge* in September, in which Year 7 produced a news sheet recording all the events of Rose Day around the school.

We are also proud to have had two teams of Year 8 Advanced Learners take part in the *RHS Green Plan-it Challenge*, a scheme run by the Royal Horticultural Society to encourage young people to create a greener planet. Our first team was called the Badgers, and they designed a community garden to be placed in Victoria Park in Macclesfield, with the concept of providing a calm oasis in a busy park, surrounded by trees and seating. Their garden had flowers as its main feature, with each 'petal' designed by a different member of the team. The second group, called the Cabbage Patch Kids, redesigned the current school garden, Wharton's Wilderness, giving it a cycling theme in memory of Guy Wharton. In the final competition, The Badgers won the Pupils Choice Award, voted for by the other teams. The Cabbage Patch Kids just missed out on the overall prize, but were complimented on their designs by the judges. The theme of the outdoor learning space also formed the subject of the first Year 8 Secret Mission competition this year, which was won by Ruby Stafford for her Sensory Garden. Lilia Almanza Torres and Tom Stott also won prizes for their excellent contributions.

Budding business students in Year 10 were also busy throughout the Autumn term, taking part in the *Dragon's Den Enterprise Competition* run by Manchester Airport in conjunction with the East Cheshire Hospice. As part of this competition, students were invited to design and produce a Christmas present for friends and family, retailing at a maximum of £5.00. After setting up a prolific production line in SF2 at lunchtimes and a fast and furious selling campaign during December, our four students, Jakob Comber, Layla Sipi, Katie Hill and Brian McClintock managed to sell all their stock of *Choccy Cups* and raised over £50.00 for the East Cheshire Hospice.

Technically astute Year 9 Advanced Learners Lewis Peal, Maddie Blunn and Matilda Bird also worked with Chris Bill, our IT Manager, and Ruth Corn to set up a website for a local business, providing activity sessions for children and their parents.

In our endeavour to help students develop skills of oracy and public speaking, we also arranged for Kate Wilson, who has worked with the English Speaking Union in a number of London schools, to come in and work with some of our Year 8 Advanced Learners on the skills of debating. Furthermore, two of our Sixth Formers, Rhian Brown, Joel Wattis succeeded in getting into the second round of the ESU Debating Competition against stiff competition from local state and private schools. This month, three of our Year 10 students will be participating in the Rotary Club Youth Speak Competition in Bidulph. The topic of their speech is *Gender Roles*.

Other events which will be taking place in the next few months are the *Bollington Live Project* for Year 7 which was a great success last year. This year the team have been challenged to produce a whole pull-out section for the magazine!

Inspired by a visit from the Manchester poet Mike Garry last term, we are launching a search for Tytherington's first Poet Laureate this half term. There will be two positions, one for KS4 and 5, and another for KS3. The post holder will have the opportunity to write poetry to celebrate important events throughout the year, and to promote the value of poetry through the school. The competition will be promoted through assemblies and English lessons this half term, so we will keep all you potential poets posted!

We are also planning a trip to *Media City for Year 9*, an *Advanced Reading Group* for students from all years, and entries for the Newnham Essay Competition for Year 12 later this year.

Additionally, we will be conducting an *Advanced Learner Review Day* in March, to evaluate the impact of the Advanced Learner programme to date, and consider where we might make improvement to the programme to benefit our students. Any suggestions from students and parents are most welcome!



# ROSE DAY

## Rose Day 2—Wednesday 18th January

Last Wednesday saw all students from Year 7-11 involved in a wide range of activities as part of their PSHE programme of learning. During the day, Year 7 took part in a workshop led by RESPECT ME focusing on self-esteem and emotional health. Following the workshop they worked with their tutor groups on a number of scenarios and discussed what advice they would give to a friend in a similar situation. Year 8 also took part in a workshop with RESPECT on bullying and followed this up with sessions on healthy eating, fitness and took part in a science experiment to investigate the impact of smoking on the body. One Year 8 student said “it shocked me how much damage smoking can do to your body”. Year 9 spent the day investigating what careers they may be suited to and had the opportunity also to meet with our careers advisor in preparation for their choosing their options later this term. Tom in Year 9 said “I now know what I would like to do and am now thinking of going to university after the workshop”. Year 10 took part in the ‘Apprentice Task’ to design, create and pitch a new range of greetings cards. The students in all tutor groups impressed with their innovative ideas ranging from relationship break up cards to vegan sourced cards! The winning team from each tutor group will now go forward to the Grand Final. Look out in the next edition for the names of the overall winners!

Year 11 had a very busy day taking part in taster sessions in the sixth form as well as interviews with the sixth form tutor team providing them with advice on their chosen pathways. Head of Year 11 Mr Pepper also took out over 40 students to Macclesfield College to find out more about college courses on offer. We were also very pleased to welcome many students from other local secondary’s who are looking to join our sixth form in September.

Following a busy two weeks for Year 12 and 13 with examinations, they had the opportunity to relax a little and take part in workshops with PC Jane Commins, Debt Cred and Bangor University on a range of topics from financial management, applying to university and online safety.

The next Rose Day is on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March and we already have booked in 3 outside speakers, the fire service and Rotary club who are coming into school to work with our students.



## KS3 CAREER READY PROGRAMME

Eleven Year 9 students had the opportunity last Friday to visit Ladderstile Farm to find out more about a career in farming. As part of the programme students in Year 9 have met with our career advisor Phil Maddocks and will be visiting different industries over the next few months to find out more about careers they may not have thought about before. Our hosts for the trip were Peter Brocklehurst and his wife, who own the family run farm. They gave the students a fantastic tour of their farm and the students had the chance to meet the livestock as well as ask questions about routes into farming. The students were very excited to discover that the farm has diversified into timber cutting and many of the students, who are part of the garden project, began to plan how the timber could be used as part of the outdoor classroom that is currently being built.

The students returned to school full of enthusiasm about future career possibilities and had a great experience despite a few incidents involving boots getting stuck in the mud!
