# Welcome

Welcome to Tytherington School Sixth Form. Our Sixth Form is at the heart of the school community and our provision for students is outstanding. Our students are provided with high calibre opportunities in a range of competitive industries such as journalism, medicine, engineering, business, law and the financial services. We also have extensive links with local businesses which has enabled us to be at the forefront of apprenticeship provision in East Cheshire.

# Personal Tutoring

The role of the Sixth Form Tutor is crucial in ensuring that all students are happy, achieve and are fully prepared for life at university or in the world of work. Every student is allocated a personal tutor when joining the Sixth Form and their role is to guide individual students through the academic and social hurdles that face all students as they prepare for examinations, independent living and the world of work. Where possible, students will have a tutor whose subject specialism is similar to their own in order that they are able to offer study support and provide expert advice on university and job applications. Students will usually remain with the same tutor throughout their time in the Sixth Form.

Sixth Form students meet in Tutor Groups or for a formal assembly weekly. This time is spent offering advice and support on self-organisation and study, as well as providing information and discussion opportunities on issues that affect young adults. Such presentations may include safe driving, alcohol/drug awareness and stress management.

Tutors make use of the remaining Tutor Periods to carry out one-to-one tutorials and students are expected to attend if they have a pre-booked appointment. Guided by regular Monitoring Reports produced by subject teachers, these tutorials allow tutors to monitor student progress and set appropriate targets. They are also used to advise students on how best to use their study time, to provide guidance on gaining work experience placements and making university applications, and to support students with any personal issues.

The role of the tutor is crucial to every student's success at Tytherington Sixth Form. Where academic monitoring and pastoral care are provided by one tutor, individual students are understood holistically and personalised guidance can be offered.

# Enrichment

Life in the Sixth Form encompasses more than academic study.

Our students are offered a range of opportunities and experiences to complement and enrich their academic work, allowing them to develop the qualities and skills for personal growth and to enhance their prospects in employment and Higher Education.

Tytherington School has an extensive range of extra-curricular activities and Sixth Form students are an intrinsic part of their success. Students can continue to pursue their interests in sport, drama, music and community action. In addition students are expected to make use of some of their study periods to participate in activities to broaden their experiences and interests. Students may spend time on activities organised independently or those organised by our specialist staff. Students may, to name but a few, choose to challenge their preconceptions in Philosophy and Politics discussions; set up their own limited company in the highly successful Young Enterprise scheme; enhance their leadership and communication skills by striving for the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award; or simply let off steam on the football or hockey pitch.

The Sixth Form experience is also enhanced through a number of Enrichment Days held throughout the school year. These days aim to provide students with information and experiences that are directly relevant to young adults. Covering areas such as healthy lifestyles, career opportunities, stress management, staying safe on the road and budget management, Enrichment Days aim to help prepare our students for the challenges and pleasures of independent living.





# Choosing a Programme of Study

Choosing a suitable Post-16 Programme of Study is crucial and a student's future career could depend on it.

Students should take account of a number of factors when making decisions about which courses to study in the Sixth Form. They should:

- choose subjects that they enjoy and can succeed in
- think carefully about the advice of their teachers, tutors and careers advisers
- think about the assessment methods of the courses they choose (Students who find examinations particularly difficult may wish to consider vocational or applied courses.)
- consider which subjects complement each other in terms of both content and skills
- look carefully at the entry requirements of the courses they wish to study and ensure that they meet them
- research the requirements of universities and employers. Universities often specify required and preferred qualifications for entry onto their degree courses.

Most students will take three A level courses. A small number may choose to study four and would be expected to achieve predominantly grades 8/9 at GCSE to do so.

In addition to timetabled lessons students are expected to spend at least three or four additional hours per subject per week studying independently and students will have study periods allocated on their timetable for private study within the school day. On rare occasions it is necessary to allocate a teaching period after school in order to allow for a broad curriculum choice. Where this is the case students receive an additional study period within the school week. There are also a number of BTEC qualifications available to students which are the equivalent of 1, 2 or 3 A Levels.

# Destinations

Students who have completed their Sixth Form studies at Tytherington progress in to Higher Education, Apprenticeships and Employment.

On average 85% of students will continue their studies at a range of universities across the country, with approximately a third of applicants securing places at the most prestigious Russell Group universities. We have a long tradition of supporting our most able students in gaining places at both Oxford and Cambridge universities, and in the highly competitive fields of Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Science.

The courses chosen by our students range from the traditional – English, Mathematics, History – to the modern and vocational – Aviation Studies, Fashion, Sport Management. The sciences and engineering are well represented, as are languages, nursing and business. Our students spread their wings, some moving as far away from Macclesfield as Plymouth, London and Glasgow; some as close to home as Stafford, Manchester and Keele.

Tytherington also provides support for those students wishing to gain Higher Apprenticeships or employment following completion of their studies. We have developed close working links with companies such as AstraZeneca and Barclays amongst others, with our students gaining highly sought after work-based training.

# How to apply

## Open Evening - November

This is an opportunity for prospective students and parents to speak to members of staff and students. It allows students to gather information about all of the courses they are considering.

## Guidance & Taster Lessons - November/December

All prospective students have a meeting with a member of the Year 11 or Sixth Form Team, to discuss post-16 pathways and subject choices. Throughout the day students also attend taster lessons to help them make their final choices.


